No Sign-Up Needed to Visit	<b>There's no need to pre-register prior to visiting the conservancy</b> and dogs on leashes are allowed Sept 1 <sup>st</sup> to April 14 <sup>th</sup> . Rules/ Conditions of use are posted by the parking lot and are also on the website.

The ABC was (briefly) in the Top 100 Most Diverse Birding Sites in WI based on eBird	Thanks to Aaron, Nicholas and Mike for adding four new warbler family species in mid-Sept. For a few weeks, we got to bask in the glow of EBird's Top 100 list for Wisconsin, tied for 98 <sup>th</sup> at 214 different species. Sadly, we've since fallen off the charts (for now anyway).
A Trumpeter Couple Successfully Raised SIX Cygnets this Summer	What a joy to watch one of the biggest families in the state survive bald eagles, coyote, river otters and the elements. Attracted attention and even AI search engines rank the ABC as a place to go in southeastern Wisconsin to see Trumpeters.
Plant List Continues to Expand	The adjusted Floristic Quality Assessment moved up to 35.8 this year as 29 new species were documented, bringing the total of good and bad to 181. The woods were a hot spot for new finds coming a year after the first burn ever to get into over half of this six-acre parcel.

New Weather Monitoring System for Jefferson County	The county's Wisconet weather monitoring system overseen by UW-Madison was installed in October. It measures soil temps, moisture, wind speeds, solar radiation, etc. Channel 12 did a piece on-site and the Trumpeter family of eight did a flyover just to be on the news!

Five new species in 2023 brings the total to 214 (with first name of finder on eBird): 1. Red-eyed Vireo (Emily) 2. Black-Throated Blue Warbler (Aaron) 3. Northern Parula (Aaron) 4. Golden-Winged Warbler (Aaron) 5. Cape May Warbler (Mike)







Aaron & Nicholas saw ~1,000 Broad-Winged Hawks on October 7<sup>th</sup> (a county record). New county high count records at the ABC also established in 2023 for Sharp-Shinned Hawks (14), Blue Jays (45) and Savannah Sparrows (55).

181 different plants and trees have been identified at the ABC (not all good). 2023 was a terrible year for white sweet clover which balloons the year after a burn. 29 new species were noted, mostly in the woods. This included: Heart-Leaf (Forest) Skullcap [7] American Jumpseed [9] Allegheny Monkey-flower River Bulrush

We've talked about a third blind for a few years and are hoping 2024 is the year it happens with the help of Mike F and the Whitewater High School supplemented by my deer hunting crew for the install. Location in the northeast corner.

This summer I added backings to the two blinds which seems to reduce the flighty factor for waterfowl watching.

Of note...

Early mornings in Jan-Mar are the best times to see owls and northern harriers Mar-Apr is a good time to catch migratory waterfowl in the ponds on the northeast side of the conservancy.

Around April 1<sup>st</sup> the yellow-headed blackbirds start arriving (no fooling). Early June is ideal to catch glimpses of the cute, tiny Trumpeter swans cygnets in the Blackbird blind pond.

Mid-to late September is often high count time at the ABC – especially good for sparrow species.
